What Is the City Doing About Aging Water Lines?

Dear Customer:

This insert is the seventh in a series that will be provided to inform you about our water and sewer services, major projects, and the cost to deliver these services.

Even though everyone's attention has been focused on the Lake Alan Henry water supply project, the City has been working concurrently to replace aging water mains that are the most vulnerable to breaks and leaks.

One critical water line replacement project in Downtown Lubbock was completed in late 2009. All of the 12-inch water mains over several blocks were replaced in an effort to reduce breaks and leaks while at the same time increasing the fire protection in the area.

Another critical water line replacement project along Quaker Avenue, 34th Street, and Avenue A will be completed during the first part of 2010. This project was designed to replace a large water main that has had an increasing frequency of breaks and leaks. Once completed, the 6-mile replacement project should provide more reliability and less leakage along the 34th Street corridor.
